Renewal

I wonder if you tried on renewal this last month. Did you try any or all of the suggestions? Please let me know if you did. I am curious what you learned or experienced.

In keeping with renewal, I was touched deeply this last week by Fr. Nick's message which focused on this passage from the Book of Micah:

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? (Micah 6: 7-8)

The prophet Micah is trying to get the people of Israel to remember their covenant with God. They are to do justice and live humbly. God does not want extravagant offerings or sacrifices. In this passage, we



witness God having an argument with his people. God is reminding the people about all the wonderful things that have been done for them. The people have gone back to their old ways and are not living their lives in a gracious way. They are no longer humble. Sound familiar? I sometimes find myself doing things in ways which are not helpful or beneficial for myself or others. I suspect we all fall into that once in a while.

What does God require? It's simple, really. Like Fr. Nick said, "It's simple, not easy, but simple."

Justice "*mishpat*" – fairness and equality in all relationships. Kindness "*hesed*" – better translated as mercy; loyalty or integrity. To walk humbly "*hatsnea lekhet*" – a way of life directly opposed to exploitation of power which is seen as the root of corruption and injustice.

How will you honor God by doing justice? How will you be kind and offer the benefit of the doubt? How will you walk humbly with God through your faith practices?

As we move ahead, I invite us again to lean into our faith and depend on the Spirit to guide us in order to be brave, courageous, kind, and loving.

Traditions

It's February, we are almost rounding the corner where the snow starts to melt and we start shedding layers to take in that spring sun.

It's also that time where a famous rodent, the groundhog, comes out of his den to tell us whether or not we will have six more weeks of winter.

My husband makes fun of me because every February, around Groundhog's, Day I get so worked up over how people 'buy in' to this urban legend. How could a groundhog possibly tell us if we are having an early spring or not. It's a rodent! Really, whether they see their shadow or not? And how do we know they actually saw their shadow...hmmm?

So, I did some research. The first Groundhog Day was initiated in 1887. According to tradition, if a groundhog comes out of its hole on this day and sees its shadow, it gets scared and runs back into its burrow, predicting six more weeks of winter weather; no shadow means an early spring.

It turns out that the roots of Groundhog Day actually lie in a Christian tradition called "Candlemas". Clergy would bless and distribute candles needed for winter. The candles represented how long and cold the winter would be.

The Germans expanded on this concept by selecting an animal-the hedgehog-as a means of predicting weather. Once they came to America, German settlers in Pennsylvania continued the tradition, although they switched from hedgehogs to groundhogs, which were plentiful in the Keystone State. This tradition has grown year to year with a three-day celebration honoring a rodent to predict the weather.

And why did I share this fun fact? Because I like learning and I am intrigued by how traditions are so important to indi- In Christ, viduals and how they live on or expire.



I think traditions are important, they preserve a culture, a heritage. They also bring comfort in an uncertain environment.

Our church community is full of great traditions: the most common ones we practice every Sunday: scripture and fellowship. They bring us comfort in an uncertain environment.

I remember a few times when we didn't have a host for fellowship, and how our church community sprung into action to make sure there was something for fellowship, even if just coffee.

Our church certainly has some long-standing traditions, but I ask, "What new traditions would you like to start at Christ Church"?

Please think about it. Just as Groundhog Day was started in 1887 and continues to this day, how do we start new traditions that will carry our church for the next 10, 20, or 100 years?

Would you be willing to steward an idea? Would you support a new tradition? The options and ideas are endless.
