Dear Friends,

I'm looking forward to joining you as Priestin-Charge this month! Two things I'll be talking about as we get to know each other are listening and welcoming. Both of these were at the heart of Jesus' ministry. Christian leadership is about listening to the Triune God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Jesus demonstrates this to us in the Gospels, as he gains confidence from listening to the Father through prayer time and time again. And listening to others around us is also critical – it's both a radical action toward unity and also how we create and build trust with those outside our circles. Improving our listening skills is a cornerstone habit for churches.

Welcoming is also critical to our discipleship. St. Benedict instructed his monks to receive all guests as Christ, citing Jesus' words in Matthew's Gospel, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me". Being welcoming – offering people a place in our lives – embodies the Gospel's message of reconciliation. Listening and welcoming demonstrate Jesus' presence in our community – and that's the unique thing we have as a church that other organizations simply cannot offer to the world.

So with those things in mind, there are two things I want us to be doing.

First, please wear your nametags on Sunday mornings (and let the office know if you need one!)

We need to wear them not only because they will help me learn your names more quickly, but because it's an outward sign that we expect and welcome visitors just as Christ did.

It's a best practice for congregations that want to grow.

Second, from time to time we'll be hearing different translations of Scripture in worship.

Although the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) is the default, the Episcopal Church has authorized 14 translations of the Bible for use in worship. (Don't worry – none of them are *The Message!*) Listening to different translations allows us to hear other voices making different decisions about how to translate out of the original Hebrew or Greek. And that will help us hear God speaking new things to us through the same Scriptures.

If nothing else, think of it as the spiritual equivalent to a balanced diet! You're all in my prayers as we make this transition into a shared life together – I hope you will keep me and my family in yours, too.

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From Bishop Loya

We live in a culture of addiction. We have any number of distractions, devices, substances, and just plain busyness that we variously use to fill the void and ache that exists in each of us. Most people I know can barely stop at a stoplight without looking at their phones... Christian spirituality is about learning to find God by becoming fully present to our lives as they really are. The twelve steps are one tried and true path to help us do that. Step 2 alone—"we came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity"—would be transformative in our lives and faith communities if all of us really and truly committed to turning our lives and wills over to God every day.

Episcopal priest Samuel Schoemaker, whom we commemorate on January 31st each year, was a key figure in the development of the twelve steps. As part of that legacy, last year we celebrated the first ever diocesan <u>Recovery Eucharist</u> to celebrate and give thanks for the wisdom and spiritual vitality that movement brings to our life together. We will celebrate this year's on Tuesday, August 15 at 6pm at St. Mark's Cathedral. I hope you will plan to join us for that.

I have also appointed a diocesan recovery commission to help organizing the Recovery Eucharist every year, as well as promote the movement generally in the diocese, and support congregations as they support those in their communities who are in recovery. The members of the commission are the Reverends Vicki Lambert, Tom Gehlsen, and Colleen Tully. We are continuing to build that membership, so if you or others might be interested in helping with that work, please do let me know.

A.A., N.A., and groups like them are a global movement of people who are finding healing, love, and new life every day of the week in church buildings and other spaces all over our communities. They hallow our spaces by meeting in our buildings, and we have much to learn from the vibrancy and vitality of that movement. I hope you will join us on August 15, and continue to pray for, give thanks, and engage the deep wisdom the recovery movement brings to all of us on the journey toward the healing we all so deeply long for, and that God so deeply longs to give us.

Especially when it involves my children or family. I recently came across a story that I felt compelled to share. I feel this story is another testament of how the Holy Spirit speaks to us. I invite you to read the story and think about how the Holy Spirit was present in this situation. This post was from June 6, 2015:

Had a feel-good moment today, made me a little emotional. I was in the Dollar Store today buying graduation cards and as I'm going through the checkouts, there's a mom in the next line with her four children. Now it has become apparent to me that this family did not have a lot but the mom was trying her best with her kids. She was buying stuff for one of the daughter's birthday. One of the boys was super pumped about being able to get a water gun, his face lite up and I even saw a fist pump when not, find an opportunity and leave an it came across the scanner and put into the bag. The one daughter (we'll call her Emma) that was going

to be on the receiving end of the birthday party was full of life and spunk and had braces with head gear on. She reminded me of Sue Heck from the sitcom "The Middle" (if you have seen this sitcom).

Emma asks her mom for a quarter, and I can hear her mom say, "Emma, are you kidding?" in a sarcastic voice. The one brother snaps back and says, "Emma, be thankful for what you have". I'm guessing the quarter was requested to be used at the little candy/toy dispensers.

It made me realize two things – that my life is so full of blessings and a quarter means more to a young girl than it does to me.

So, as I was leaving, I dug into my purse and pulled out four quarters, walked up to the girl, handed them to her and told her to share with her siblings. I wish you all could have seen the look on her face and her reaction. It was like someone handed her a \$100 bill. It was the most profound moment in my life, and I still tear up with it. As I was walking away, I hear the girl say, "Look what that lady just gave me!". I kept walking knowing that I made that girl and family's day by this simple gesture. I know that giving up four quarters was nothing for me and could've given so much more but at that moment, that simple act left an imprint on her and hopefully she will remember it.

For those of you that grew up with everything and never had to struggle or go without, this is how those that had to do without need your compassion. Don't blame the child for the misfortune of the parents, help them. At most times, the parents are doing the best they can with what they have to work with.

As I relived this story, I can still see the reaction on that child's face, and it still brings a tear to my eye. Do you have story like this to share? If impression.
