And speaking of time....

Third Friday Fun Night . . .

I want to encourage everyone to come to our Third Friday Fun Night on October 27th from 5:00 to 7:00. (Yes, it's the fourth Friday. Rules are meant to be broken.) All of our Third Friday Fun Nights will have two elements: an activity, and a dinner. This month we're blessed to have Episcopal Church Women providing both the dinner and a pumpkin carving activity!

One thing I've discerned in my short time here is how hungry we are as a congregation for opportunities to gather and be a community. So while our Fun Fridays have been geared in the past for younger families, we're working hard this year to create events that will appeal to parishioners of all ages. So even if you aren't interested in things like pumpkin carving or bingo, come anyway for a free meal and to deepen our ties as a community! Nothing would make me happier than packing our parish hall one night a month.

Expectations For Me . . .

One of the things I've learned is that for any group to be successful, it needs to have shared expectations about the work it does together. So I want us to think for a few minutes about ministry and what standards and expectations we should have for each other as we labor together in God's vineyard.

When I was ordained to the priesthood last year, I took a set of vows. There's an excellent guide from the Episcopal Diocese of Newark that uses these vows to create expectations for priests and their ministry. Here are those vows – along with a summary of the things they require me to do.

Will you respect and be guided by the pastoral direction and leadership of your bishop?

- I will attend ECMN's Annual Convention, the Clergy Conference, and the annual Renewal of Ordination Vows
- I will provide information about Christ Church to the bishop upon request and will seek the bishop's counsel on matters as necessary.

Will you be diligent in the reading and study of the Holy Scriptures and in seeking the knowledge of such things as may make you a stronger and more able minister of Christ?

- I will observe daily times for prayer, Scripture reading, and meditation or otherwise engage in some Rule of Life.
- I will participate in Reconciliation of a Penitent (confession) as needed.
- I will maintain a regular program of continuing education.
- I will participate in mutual ministry reviews.

Will you endeavor so to minister the Word of God and the sacraments of the New Covenant, that the reconciling love of Christ may be known and received?

I will ensure that all parishioners receive instruction in the faith and ministry of the Church and in Christian stewardship.

I will ensure people are prepared for Baptism, Confirmation, Reception, and Reaffirmation.

Will you undertake to be a faithful pastor to all whom you are called to serve, laboring together with them and your fellow ministers to build up the family of God?

- I will encourage the development of "shared ministry" so that our congregational life allows us to live into the theology of a priesthood of all believers.
- I will pursue opportunities to work with other congregations and clergy of all faiths, and with community organizations.
- I will lead us in complying with mandated activities, including parochial reports, Safe Church training, and maintaining the Parish Register.
- I will be involved in the life, councils, and activities of the Episcopal Church in Minnesota.

Will you do your best to pattern your life in accordance with the teachings of Christ, so that you may be a wholesome example to your people?

- I will practice responsible stewardship of financial resources.
- I will pay attention to my physical and emotional health.
- I will ensure that I take regular days off each week and use my vacation time.
- I will participate in activities that promote my development, including retreats and spiritual direction.
- I will spend intentional and significant time "away from the congregation" with family, friends, or engaged in community activities.

We could go a lot deeper into the weeds, of course. But I hope this gives us some shared standards to hold me accountable to.

... and Expectations For You.

But in return, I'll be holding you all accountable as well -- because the ministry of the laity is just as important as the ministry of deacons, priests, and bishops! As we focus on our themes of Prayer, Discernment, and Welcome this year, here are my expectations for our shared life. We come together for corporate worship and fellowship.

We work, pray, and give for the spread of God's reign.

We deepen our relationship with God through prayer, learning, and Scripture. We discern where Christ is leading, and commit to follow.

As always, I'll hold each of you in prayer -I hope you'll do the same for me.

Thoughts from our Deacon

Children seldom raise the issue of fairness when they are being favored. In fact, adults don't raíse the issue of fairness when they are favored or privileged either. Frequently church problems are identified as "fairness" problems. And they are.

There is a lot of unfairness in churches. There is a lot of unfairness in life. Anyone who God's power into our experience and wants to fill their heart and life with resentment will have ample opportunity to do so.

The scandal of our faith is that we are often covetous and jealous when God's gifts of forgiveness and life are given to others in equal measure. That's a tough pill to swallow.

We covet what God chooses to give to others.

And in our relationships, covetousness is a here. Also remember, you are not alone; problem. The point here isn't necessari- we are in this together "striving side by side ly that other folks receive blessings from with one mind for the faith of the gos-God that we don't — that they get more pel." (Phil 1:27) or better or lovelier gifts from God. The problem is that they get the same as us; and they don't deserve it, do they? They are somehow less worthy, or different, or just plain "bad" or "lazy" people. They don't deserve the same as we get, do they? Not nothing maybe, but certainly not the same. The scandal here is that we are all equal recipients of God's gifts, regardless.

Jesus invites us to move beyond fairness and into boundless love.

The kind of love Jesus calls us to is grounded in, and in fact, is his own sacrificial love. This love was won on the cross. Suffering preceded Jesus' death. Jesus' death was unjust. We might see it as a cosmically unfair event. But that awful death became the door to Resurrection for Jesus. In Jesus' Resurrection we see the meaning of suffering, the meaning of injustice, and the meaning of death transformed by knowledge of God's limitless love.

God looks at us and says, "I love you just the way you are."

God's love is not conditional on our behavior, God just wants us to show up and work. This work is about being a sign of love to the world, and finding ways to love others even if they don't agree with us, look like us, or behave the way we want them to. It is each of our own responsibility to build community regardless of when we got

Be a sign - maybe even a flashing beacon - of love in the world. Love radically and scandalously. You have all you need. Each and every one of you is a beloved child of God. You are enough.





Fall is here, the smell in the air is of the leaves changing and dropping to the ground.

The earth brings us wonders of color before the leaves fall to the ground. We are so fortunate to witness this wonder every fall. So, I did a little research. According to the Forest Service:

During the growing season, chlorophyll is continually being produced and broken down and leaves appear green. As night length increases in the autumn, chlorophyll production slows down and then stops and eventually all the chlorophyll is destroyed. The carotenoids and anthocyanin that are present in the leaf are then unmasked and show their colors.

There are so many things I love about Autumn. The change in colors brings cooler days and brisk evenings to sit by the fire or cuddle up under a blanket with a good book or movie. The coffee shops are enjoying their revenue increase with pumpkin spice everything, it's a phenomenon that can't be explained, just enjoyed. I enjoy bringing out my soup recipes. My husband, on the other hand is not as much of a fan, he's a casserole man. I'm sharing one of my favorite soup recipes, look for it later in the caller.

What I also love about fall is the increased hustle and bustle at church.

Irish Root Soup (in honor of Irish Heritage)

Ingredients

2 tablespoons olive oil 1 tablespoon butter 2 pounds carrots, peeled and sliced 2 leeks (white part only), sliced 6 cloves garlic, peeled and chopped 2 pounds sweet potatoes, peeled, halved, boiled and oven-roasted * 4 cups chicken stock 2 cups whipping cream plus whipped cream for garnish Pinch of salt Pinch of white pepper 2 tablespoons granulated sugar

Instructions

1. Heat oil and butter in large, heavy saucepan over medium heat. Add carrots, leeks, garlic and sweet potatoes. Sauté until leeks are translucent, about 8 minutes.

2. Add stock and cream. Cover and simmer until carrots and potatoes are very soft, stirring occasionally, about 30 minutes.

3. Puree soup in batches in blender. Return soup to same saucepan. Add salt, pepper and sugar. Taste and adjust seasonings.

Stir soup over medium heat until heated through. Ladle into bowls and top with whipped cream.

Notes

* Boil potatoes about 10 minutes, then oven-roast by placing potatoes on cookie sheet in 350 degree F oven about 30 minutes, or until browned and tender.
